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**MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING
OF THE LA SALLE CITY COUNCIL
HELD IN THE COUNCIL CHAMBERS,
745 SECOND STREET, LA SALLE, IL.
7:00 P.M., Monday, April 24, 2017**

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

ROLL CALL

A quorum was present.

Mayor Grove began the meeting by updating the public regarding a resolution concerning the K-9 Program. Mayor Grove recognized Assistant State's Attorney Brian Vescogni, as well as State's Attorney Karen Donnelly for her assistance in this resolution. Mayor Grove stated that at the meeting on April 10, 2017, State's Attorney Donnelly made an offer to fund the canine program. At that time, the Mayor could not agree to the offer as he did not have any of the details. Over the past two weeks, meetings have been held with Officers Zebbron and Manicki, Union Representatives, Attorney Vescogni and the State's Attorney. An agreement has been reached and the Mayor thanked all who were involved in making this happen. Mayor Grove read a Press Release concerning the tentative agreement. (Exhibit A)

Mike Girton asked who the task force group was referred to in the Press Release. Mayor Grove stated that once the agreement is finalized, the group name will be provided but at this time he preferred to keep it generic.

Assistant State's Attorney Brian Vescogni stated that the States Attorney's office was happy to help and he believed this agreement will be beneficial to everyone. Mayor Grove thanked Attorney Vescogni for his personal assistance and asked that he thank everyone in the State's Attorney's office.

Mr. John Connon and Mr. Thomas Sasgen addressed the council regarding a grass roots campaign of the United States Submarine Veterans, Inc. to fund a memorial in the City of Chicago that honors WWII Submarine veterans. The memorial will be located along the Chicago River off of Lake Shore Drive. The group has secured 70% of the funding necessary for the project. During the 1940's, the gentlemen explained, these submarines made their way down the Illinois River as part of the journey to the Panama Canal. The group is asking that the council consider purchasing a memorial legacy paver to recognize the connection the submarines and veterans had to La Salle.

Moved by Alderman Schneider and seconded by Alderman Herndon to grant the request of John Dzierzynski to break curb for a driveway at 2295 Washington Street. Each and every alderman has a copy.

Alderman Bacidore updated the council on a request from US Silica, LLC to lower the speed limit from 25 mph to 10 mph on N. 3029th Road. The State speed limit of 30 mph would apply on that roadway. Presently, there was only one speed limit sign in the vicinity of the plant and it was unreadable. Therefore, the City has posted new 30 mph speed limit signs to see if this will help slow down traffic since there were no readable speed limit signs previously. If there continues to be a problem, US Silica will petition the council again for a speed limit reduction.

Attorney McPhedran stated that the settlement with XPO Logistics will result in a savings to the taxpayer as this settlement is less than it would have been had the City not disputed it. In addition, this overpayment will be paid out the TIF fund where it was originally deposited. The funds are available and no funds will come out of the General Fund in regard to this payment.



PRESS RELEASE

Late last week an agreement was reached between the City of La Salle and the Office of the State's Attorney for La Salle County regarding the reallocation of certain La Salle Police Department K9 Unit resources. Under the terms of the agreement, the Office of the State's Attorney for La Salle County has agreed to cover the expenses associated with one police canine in conjunction with the reassignment of that canine and one City of La Salle Police Officer to a special drug enforcement agency currently in need of a police dog and handler. According to the Office of the State's Attorney, the cost of the canine will be paid using money from its drug fund.

City of La Salle Mayor Jeff Grove presented this proposal to the Office of the State's Attorney after La Salle County State's Attorney Karen Donnelly recently attended a La Salle City Council meeting and mentioned the availability of funding from her office that could be used to cover of the expenses associated with maintaining a police dog. While the expense of operating a K9 Unit was a primary concern for City of La Salle officials, it wasn't the sole concern. The increased efficiencies and productivity that will naturally result from expanded community policing by the canine and its handler along with the financial assistance from the Office of the State's Attorney sufficiently address all weaknesses of the current program and make this an attractive and beneficial collaboration for the entire community.

"This is a great partnership not only for the City of La Salle but also for La Salle County and the broader community. We feel it is an excellent use of the very capable resources of the Police Officer and police dog, and we are confident that the inefficiencies of our old K9 program, financial and otherwise, are satisfactorily addressed by this new plan. Most importantly, the entire County has the potential to reap the benefits of this alliance. We thank the State's Attorney for agreeing to the arrangement" Mayor Grove stated.

Another beneficial facet of the agreement is that the performance of the canine in the drug enforcement agency will be regularly reviewed by the City of La Salle, the Office of the State's Attorney, and the members of the drug enforcement agency's governing board giving all parties the option to continue the new partnership so long as the results justify the costs. The police dog and City of La Salle Police Officer will need to be approved by the policy board of the drug enforcement agency at its next meeting before the proposal between the City of La Salle and the Office of the State's Attorney for La Salle County can be finalized.
